Vermont Leadership Series Needs You

The <u>Vermont Leadership Series</u> trains Vermonters with disabilities, and their family members, to be advocates for positive social change. Nearly 100 Vermonters have participated so far. Graduates get involved! For example, several Leadership graduates have joined boards, committees, or advisory work groups on a variety of important topics. Leadership participants also get a chance to connect with their classmates. One recent grad commented, "The support I get from this group has enhanced my life tremendously, and allowed me to be more available to and effective for my family."

The Leadership Series, which begins November 9, consists of three weekends (Saturday & Sunday with an overnight at a hotel). Using Family and Medical Leave Act (FMLA) to Attend IEP Meetings

A new <u>opinion letter</u> (August 2019) from the U.S. Department of Labor (DOL) suggests that many parents of students with disabilities are entitled to take time away from work to attend their child's individualized education program (IEP) meetings.

The DOL was responding to an inquiry from a parent whose employer had granted Family Medical Leave Act for her two children's medical appointments but denied a request that attending IEP meetings be treated in the same way. The guidance is only binding in this particular situation but suggests that the DOL might be sympathetic to a broader understanding of the FMLA. This is not a tool that fits all family circumstances, but it's a very good approach to keep in mind.

Leadership Opportunity for Youth

The Youth Advocacy Council (YAC) is comprised of youth and young adults with differing abilities, ages 14 to 26, who are interested in participating in leadership training and opportunities to improve how Vermont prepares students with disabilities for life after high school. Members connect with students, advocate for youth resources, and lead while providing community service. The YAC organized the first annual Youth Summit in May 2019. This was a conference for youth and run by youth for the purpose of promoting self-advocacy amongst youth with disabilities.
