What do Civil Rights have to do with School Lunches?

Did you know that Vermont is required to administer child nutrition programs in accordance with all non-discrimination laws, regulations, instructions, policies, and guidance? This includes annual training on civil rights in child nutrition programs.

So what does this mean if your child has a disability? Here is one example from the <u>Accommodating Children with Disabilities in School Meal Programs manual</u>, one of many resources on the Vermont Agency of Education's website.

Question: A child with autism is very sensitive to food textures, and will only eat foods with a smooth texture. Is the child's condition considered a disability, and if so, must the school food service make a modification for the child?

Answer: Yes. According to the ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act), any physical or mental impairment impacting the "major life activity" of eating is considered a disability. Some children with autism have sensory sensitivities and prefer food of a certain texture or color. They may require the same foods every day and need to maintain a regular routine. If a child's autism impacts their ability to consume Program meals, the SFA (School Food Authorities) must provide a reasonable modification.

Vermont Health Information Exchange Moves to "Opt-Out" starting March 1

The Vermont Health Information Exchange lets doctors, nurses, hospitals and pharmacies securely read, share and add to your medical record across Vermont. It puts your providers on the same page. Beginning March 1, they are switching their consent policy from "opt-in" to "opt-out." This means that you automatically are agreeing to have your medical records shared unless you take steps to "opt-out." What are Transition Core Teams?

There are 14 local transition core teams that cover all of Vermont. These teams are run by Vocational Rehabilitation transition counselors and should include members from the school, adult agencies and the community who are involved with the transition of students with disabilities from school to adult life.
