- Project SEARCH Project SEARCH is a nationally recognized, unique, business-led, one-year, transition program that takes place entirely at the host business. Total

workplace immersion facilitates a seamless combination of classroom instruction, career exploration, and relevant job-skills training through a series of three ten to twelve-week internships, approximately 9 months (late August to early June). Interns must have completed their high school program and be between the ages of 18 and 36. They must have appropriate hygiene, social and communication skills. They must have the ability to take direction and change behavior. Most of all, they must possess a desire to work! The primary outcome of Project SEARCH upon program graduation is employment within the community for at least 16-24 hours per week earning minimum wage or better in a year-round, inclusive setting.
