

There has been a sickness that has been making people feel ill since last year. That sickness is called COVID- 19. We have done a really good job of taking care of each other in Vermont. We can take care of each other by catching our coughs and sneezes, being at a distance from others, wearing masks when inside, washing our hands, and staying home when we are sick.



Another way to take care of ourselves and others is to get a shot, or vaccine. Getting the vaccine will only take a minute and feels like getting a little pinch.




Getting the vaccine helps me to fight the covid sickness and keeps the sickness away from others. I will get a COVID-19 vaccine, so I don't get very sick. I can remind myself that, I am helping others! And I can do hard things!





When we arrive at the doctor's office, I will need to put on my mask when I get out of the car.




My family will give the doctor any information they need to know about me, like my name and my age.

I can also ask any questions or wonders about the vaccine. I will check in and then sit and wait for the nurse to call my name.



I may see people dressed up in gowns, gloves, masks, and face shields. They wear this gear to keep us all safe from passing the sickness to others. Even though I can't see their faces, the helpers are very glad to see me and want to take good care of me! If I feel nervous or confused, I can ask, "what is your name?". Or I can ask any other things that I might wonder about. They are happy to help me stay healthy.




Before I get the shot, I will be able to choose a special comfort item to play with while getting the shot.



The shot goes in my upper arm with a needle. This needle feels like a little pinch and will be over quickly.



When it is my turn, I will roll up my sleeve or take off my jacket. I'll remind myself, *I Got This*!



I will need to relax and sit still. I can relax by closing my mouth and breathing into my nose while I count to 4. Then I can exhale out of my mouth for the count of 8. My family or staff can remind me to breath in and out and help me count.

If I feel nervous, I can look away from my arm, close my eyes, or sing a song. I can also play with my comfort item.



I can listen to music or talk to someone who supports me.



The helper will wipe my arm with a cold, wet cotton square or swab.



It might smell funny.



The shot may feel like a pinch or a poke, but it will be over very quickly.




The helper will put a band-aid over the spot where I got my vaccination. I did it!




I did it!



After my shot, I can pick a special prize. I may need to wait a few minutes to make sure I am healthy to go home. While I am waiting, I can play with my comfort item.



My arm might be sore after the shot, or I might feel tired, have chills, a fever, or a headache for a short time. If I feel any of these, I can tell my parents or caregiver.



I will need a second shot a few weeks after my first shot. When I come back in a few weeks, I will go through the same steps to get my second shot.

The vaccine will start to protect me about 14 days after my second shot. So, it is important that I continue to keep myself and others safe by wearing a mask.



I will continue to stay safe by wearing a mask, staying at least 6 feet away from others, and practicing healthy habits like handwashing and using hand sanitizer.

I want to keep everyone healthy and safe from COVID-19. I can do this! I am proud of myself for getting this vaccine. I can be brave and calm and make safe choices. I am keeping myself and others who live in Vermont healthy.

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
