Dear Friends, Colleagues, and Supporters,

What a remarkable year we have had, serving families of children with special needs and the professionals who serve them across the state of Vermont. Thanks for your encouragement and investment in Vermont Family Network! Together, we have accomplished a great deal, and we are proud to share some of this year's achievements with you. Of note, our staff and board spent focused time reflecting on our mission and vision, and emerged with a new sense of purpose, as well as clearer statements about who we are and how we make a unique difference.

As this Annual Report for July 1, 2014-June 30, 2015 will illustrate, VFN has made a positive impact in empowering and supporting families of children with special needs throughout Vermont. We provided information and assistance 4320 times across the state, touching every region in some way. This year, we directly served 1024 families and 439 professionals. Our Children's Integrated Services – Early Intervention program served 446 children in Chittenden County and we conducted 30 workshops and 15 webinars for parents and professionals on a variety of topics. Our Family Faculty trained 453 medical and education professionals, utilizing the skills of 25 family members expert in caring for their own children with special needs. We have greatly improved our outreach and support of new American families, connecting with many diverse communities in ways that are more culturally and linguistically accessible.

We are fortunate to have many strong partnerships with individuals and organizations across the state – through them, we are able to enhance our capacity to meet families' identified needs. VFN promotes family leadership in all aspects of our work. We believe strongly in family voice and the strengths and gifts of people with disabilities. We believe that everyone can make a difference. We believe that when we support one another, we bring out our individual and collective best.

Your input is key to supporting great outcomes for children with special needs of all ages throughout the state. We welcome you to volunteer in our outreach, events, committees, advocacy opportunities at the Legislature, Board, and more. Together, we will continue to create measurable impact as Vermont's "go-to" resource for families of children with special needs.

FAMILY SUPPORT PROGRAM

VFN's Family Support Program has completed another year as the statewide Family-to-Family Health Information Center and Parent Training and Information Center. These core programs allow us to assist families with navigation of both health and special education systems. These complex systems often leave families in need of assistance with understanding laws, parental rights, and collaboration with professionals.

Through grant funding we offer Vermont families opportunities for respite, conference and training experiences, and medically necessary services and products that are not otherwise covered. We work directly with schools and the Vermont Agency of Education

to help facilitate parent engagement in all tiers of education and disseminate information to families through workshops, webinars, and printed materials.

Family Support is a vital part of Vermont Family Network's mission. We listen to families and offer resources, support, and growth opportunities. Families of children with special needs return to us several times throughout their children's lives and we are ready to assist however we can. Our goal is always to empower families with knowledge and experiences that will help them to move forward with confidence. As experienced parents of children with special needs, our staff is uniquely qualified to achieve this goal.

CHILDREN'S INTEGRATED SERVICES — EARLY INTERVENTION PROGRAM

VFN's Chittenden County Children's Integrated Services – Early Intervention Program (CIS-EI) is part of Vermont's statewide system of coordinated services for pregnant women and young children. CIS-EI serves children ages 0-3 years old with developmental delays or health conditions which may lead to developmental delays and provides coordinated services in natural environments, such as homes and early care and education programs where children without disabilities also participate. CIS-EI also facilitates parents' or caregivers' ability to integrate play-based developmental interventions that are interesting and functional into the daily routines of their children.

In FY15, we served 446 children/families, received 368 referrals to Children's Integrated Services Early Intervention (CIS-EI), and served 14 children in our intensive Autism program.

CIS-EI FY 2014 FAMILY OUTCOMES


Our FY 14 CIS El Family Outcomes Survey showed that:

84% of parents reported that early intervention services have helped them know their parental rights.

90% reported that early intervention services have helped their family effectively communicate their child's needs.

85% reported that early intervention services have helped their family help their children to develop and learn.

Our Child Outcome Summary results showed that children served through our CIS El program were above the state target for those who have substantially increased their rate of growth in the areas of positive social-emotional skills, acquisition and use of knowledge and skills, and use of appropriate behaviors to meet their needs.

A STORY OF SUCCESS

It is with a heavy heart that I am writing to you. My son, Clark, is turning 3 in a few days. Today will be the last day he has services with Kathleen Fitzgerald: his teacher, friend, and someone that he believes is part of our family. Let's be honest – she is.

When we first started this journey February 2014 I was completely unsure about what was going to happen and the future of my son. He was 18 months and he wasn't using language like his twin brother or pretend play or even looking at us when we called his name. I was so frightened for his future.

Suddenly, Clark had a team of people. It started with Eileen McCoy – who put up with my behavior and then came Kathleen, Jamie Rainville, Lisa Cannizarro, and Melanie Pope for OT. I have never been more impressed with a group of people like I have been with these women. We met monthly and shared how much progress Clark was making and it really became self-evident that they figured out what worked to help Clark learn.

Today he is "high functioning" according to the CDC and I am no longer worried about the future for my son. With their guidance and support I've come to realize that Clark is not only sweet but he's also unique and brilliant. His language has exploded and he is speaking like a four year old. He is able to communicate, memorizes books and puzzles, uses expressive faces, makes jokes, pretend plays, and is one of the best kids around.

I don't know where Clark would be without the women listed above and I know our lives have changed for the better because of it. I hope you appreciate them as much as we do and will continue to keep them as part of our family forever.

THE VERMONT LEADERSHIP SERIES

In partnership with the Vermont Developmental Disabilities Council, UVM's Center on Disability and Community Inclusion, and Green Mountain Self Advocates, VFN created a unique opportunity to develop family voice and individual advocacy. This new collaborative effort exemplifies our mission to empower and support all Vermont families of children with special needs. Eighteen family members and individuals with disabilities from the southernmost to the northernmost ends of the state participated. Parents who took part had children of various ages, and the cohort included a wide variety of diagnostic experiences. Participants attended three weekends of intensive training highlighted

by group activities and well-known guest speakers. The Series culminated in a graduation ceremony at the Statehouse with the Speaker of the House giving a keynote address to the graduates and the Treasurer of the State of Vermont presenting diplomas.


Several graduates from this Leadership


LISTENING TO THOSE WE SERVE

We received 199 family responses and 50 partner responses which highlighted Information, Referral, and Assistance as the service most utilized and most valued. 
